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

Hot topic: water-heater rebates



FOR MANY YEARS now, Blue Ridge members have received assistance from our energy conservation advisor. This employee possesses a broad understanding of what constitutes the wise use of electricity in a residence.

Often, his personal, up-close look at a home will reveal steps a family could take to reduce their electricity consumption.

One particular appliance that regularly attracts his scrutiny is the electric water heater. This wonderful unit is able to supply instant and abundant hot water to a home's occupants. When it's working properly, it's truly a blessing.

Dangerous fumes

A British painter, Benjamin Waddy Maughan, is credited with patenting the first residential water heater in 1868. His invention used natural gas to heat the H₂O, but it didn't have a flue for the ventilation of the gas vapors. Consequently, the device was unsafe for household use. Later refinements added safety features such as a flue that could evacuate the dangerous fumes. Even today, either a gas or propane water heater must be installed adjacent to an outside wall, so that the gas vapors can be released into the outer air.

During the last 30 years or so, electric water heaters have really come into their own. The fact that an electric model can be located anywhere within a home's interior represents a genuine advantage. In addition, it operates at a higher level of energy efficiency than its fossil-fuel counterparts. On top of that, manufacturers of electric water heaters are finding ways to make them even more efficient.

Cash incentive

Water heaters are durable, but they don't last forever. After a good many

years, they'll pass their prime and their efficiency begins to decline. That's where the discerning eye of the cooperative's energy conservation advisor can ride to the rescue. He can usually tell when a water heater is on its last legs, and he has a nice cash incentive he can then share with the member: Blue Ridge offers a \$200 to \$300 rebate toward the replacement of the old unit. In the last six years, nearly 2,900 co-op members have availed themselves of this rebate. Also, for members converting from a natural gas or propane water heater to an electric model, the rebate is either \$500 or \$600.

Whether or not our energy conservation advisor has visited your dwelling, you might have already realized that it's time to change out your existing hot water source. I encourage you to contact us at Blue Ridge to arrange for your rebate. It's a simple process.

You're also encouraged to look over the information that's included in this month's magazine about our charity fundraiser, Blue Ridge Fest. That May 1 event is fast approaching, and I want to issue a cordial invitation for you to join us for an enjoyable evening. Also, next month's edition of *South Carolina Living* will be devoted to the cooperative's annual meeting, which is scheduled for Thursday, April 23. We're working hard on preparations for what is the number-one occasion on the Blue Ridge calendar. If you come, I can promise you a warm welcome, an inspiring program, and an honest assessment of the progress your cooperative continues to make. I hope to see you there.

WOMEN RETURNING to school to earn college degrees may now apply for financial assistance from the 2020 Jenny Ballard Opportunity Scholarship program.



Recipients will receive scholarships for the fall 2020 or spring 2021 semester, with funds paid to the college or university.



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Ronnie Milsap shares talents at 2020 Blue Ridge Fest

EXCITEMENT IS BUILDING with the announcement of this year's entertainment for the 23rd annual Blue Ridge Fest. Held in Pickens on the campus of Blue Ridge Electric Cooperative, this event has grown each year and now boasts a crowd of more than 5,000. This year holds something for every music lover with the appearance of Ronnie Milsap, Restless Heart, and the ever-popular Tams.


With a career beginning in 1973, Ronnie Milsap is one of music's most popular and influential performers of the 70s and 80s. His first #1 hit, Pure Love, came in 1974 and from that point on, his career soared with hits and awards. Milsap was named the Country Music Association's Male Vocalist of the Year in 1974 and would receive the same honor in 1976 and 1977. Throughout his career he has had 40 number-one country hits and won six Grammys and eight CMAs.

His 1981 hit "Smoky Mountain Rain" introduced him to a larger audience when it crossed over to the pop charts. Along with "Smoky Mountain Rain," some of his other big hits were "Lost in the Fifties Tonight," "I Wouldn't Have Missed it for the World," "What a Difference You Made in my Life," and "It Was Almost Like a Song."

Restless Heart, an American country music band, formed in 1984. They have released seven studio albums and two greatest hits albums and have enjoyed one of the most successful careers in country music history. Placing over 25 singles on the charts, with six consecutive #1 hits, four of their albums have been certified Gold by the RIAA. Restless Heart has won awards including the Academy of Country Music's Top Vocal Group trophy. Their hits include "I'll Still be Loving You," "When She Cries," "The Bluest Eyes in Texas," and "That Rock Won't Roll."

The Tams need no introduction to Fest attendees. They have appeared a number of times and entertained the crowd with their music, their songs and their choreography.

All of this great entertainment will be at the Blue Ridge Electric Cooperative office on Main Street in Pickens on Friday, May 1. We hope you'll join us for a night of Great Times for Great Causes.

This is a unique opportunity for individuals to come together and have a fun time while improving the lives of many."


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
